


Why Progressive Pathways?



53% of Illinois jobs require less than a bachelor's degree and more than a high school education.

Only 42% of workers are trained for these jobs.

Opportunities for Impact

For those who wish to help build, expand, and uplift Progressive Pathway Programs and the work that they do, there are many opportunities to contribute. Here, we present six programs that CWFA believes to be exemplars of their fields and champions of equity, empowerment, and economic prosperity for the Chicagoland community.



YearUp Chicago

- > Essential training, skill development, and industry-recognized credentials to help young adults secure well-paying jobs
- > 76% of 2020 graduates were employed or enrolled in school within 4 months of graduation, and employed graduates earned an average starting wage of \$20.67 per hour
- ➤ Seeking support to provide 280 young adults with the foundation, training, and experience needed to continue their education and launch successful careers

HANA Center

- ➤ Digital literacy ESL classes with technology certification and apprenticeships for unemployed Korean American immigrant women in Chicago's Northwest suburbs
- ➤ An estimated **50%** of program participants obtain employment or enroll in continued education within 6 months of graduation
- > Seeking support to provide paid apprenticeships that will lead to permanent placements in healthcare administration and related fields

National Able Network

- ➤ Helps break down systemic injustices and support equity in the workplace by empowering people though employment
- ➤ IT Career Lab program helps job seekers launch new careers in technology, boasting a 90% completion rate and average starting wage of \$18.37 per hour for program graduates
- > Seeking support for career coaching. training, certification, and placement of program graduates

Skills for Chicagoland's

- ➤ **Employer-driven** program providing unemployed young adults entry to longterm careers through experience, education, and supportive services
- > Skills has placed 164 individuals into career pathways across multiple industries, meeting retention rates far above industry and employer standards
- > Seeking support for stipends. supportive services, mentoring, coaching, and expansion aligned with demand, e.g. health care pathways

Inspiration Corporation

- > Supportive services and job training in the **culinary industry**, one of few career paths open to people with multiple barriers to employment
- ➤ Approximately 85% of graduates who complete a transitional job are placed in unsubsidized employment
- ➤ Seeking support for garden supplies for our production garden in East Garfield Park, which provides learning opportunities for job training, and produce for emergency free meals

Per Scholas

- > Tuition-free training, professional development, and robust employer connections for individuals traditionally underrepresented in the tech industry
- > 85% of learners graduate, and 80% of graduates are placed within one year of program completion
- > Seeking support for recruitment, training, and direct placement costs for individuals interested in technology and are seeking a better career path
